She is the daughter of immigrants from the Philippines, mother of a kindergartener, and spouse of a proud Vermonter. Beauty, gratitude, and love are at the heart of her faithful striving for collective liberation and a thriving planet.

## NUUC COVID-19 Response Plan

Church leaders including Minister, Board of Trustees, CoSM and others will monitor daily announcements from the Center for Disease Control (<u>www.CDC.gov</u>), Larimer County Health Department (<u>www.larimer.org/health</u>) and UUA (<u>www.UUA.org</u>) and follow all Colorado government instructions and recommendations.

- General instructions on managing contagion will be posted at all church doors

#### CANCELLING SERVICES and PROGRAMS

- As per established NUUC policy, services and programs may be cancelled by consensus of at least two of the following people: Minister, President, Chair of COSM, Ministry Chair or program/activity lead
- When services/programs are cancelled, the activity lead will make (or delegate) every effort to contact participants directly by email or phone as well as notice on website as appropriate.
- Virtual services via the internet will be planned by Minister and Worship Associates as technically possible and announcement/instructions made via email blasts and on website
- NUUC programs will be held virtually as determined by the lead.

#### **PROTECTIVE PRACTICES**

- Everyone inside the church buildings must wear face masks at all times.
- Disposable face masks will be provided in each building
- 'Social distancing' will be practiced by staying at least 6' from other individuals when crowd restrictions allow face-to-face gatherings

- Once the building is full, no more will be admitted and must wait in outside grounds still remaining 6' apart; consider holding additional services
- Cleaning/Disinfecting Surfaces
- CDC-approve chlorine and alcohol-based (at least 60%) solutions and disposable paper towels will be used after each building use to wipe down all surfaces which may have been touched including pews, tables, chairs, light/ heat switches doorknobs, railings, faucet handles in both kitchen and rest rooms
- Cleaners should wear protective gloves while cleaning
- NUUC Janitor will be responsible for weekly cleaning
- Activity organizer will be responsible for cleaning & disinfecting all surfaces touched during their programs. Cleaning responsibility will be included in Building Use Guidelines.
- Refreshments at services will be limited to commercially wrapped food items and juices. No home -made finger foods will be allowed.
- Disposable dishes and flatware will be used whenever food or drink is served
- Multiple containers of hand-sanitizer, disinfecting wipes/spray will be made available in both sanctuary and Parker Hall as available.
- NUUC staff and volunteers will work remotely as much as possible

### **CARING FOR EACH OTHER**

- Stay home if you are ill, <u>especially with a fever or cough</u>
- If any member/friend would like 'wellness checks' (a church member to call you regularly to stay in touch and reduce social isolation), please contact Pastoral Care Team at <u>PastoralCare@NamaquaUU.org</u> and they will set up a system
- If you would like assistance with groceries or other urgent supplies, please contact Pastoral Care who will arrange for home delivery (leaving on front porch/ garage)
- If you are ill, please let either the minister or PCT know. They will respect your confidentiality as you wish.
- Pastoral Care has a modest Emergency Fund for folks who are financially vulnerable, if you are in need contact PCT

## President's Message

From the Board President

I hope everyone is doing well and staying safe!

We're getting better and better at doing 'Beloved Community' in these times of Coronavirus. We're becoming more proficient at our Zoom Sunday Services – it's so good to see so many faces! – and more and more meetings are appearing on the calendar that take advantage of our Zoom meeting room (which can be reserved by sending a note to <u>calendar@namaquauu.org</u>; you might want to check our website's calendar first to be sure it's available, at <u>namaquauu.org</u>). There's a regularly scheduled Thursday lunch bunch – see the website – and we're even starting to offer workshops and classes – see this newsletter for a book club announcement!

And we held our congregational meeting in May, virtually. Thank you to all who attended and thank you to our presenters! In case you missed it:

- Laurel gave a Minister's report, thanking everyone for keeping us going through these VUCA times: Volatile, Uncertain, Complex and Ambiguous. Online ministry and covenant groups will become ever more important going forward.
- Sally Henry presented an overview of the Committee on Shared Ministry's work, with its 11 (!) ministries, all staffed by volunteers. CoSM achieved all of its goals for the year!
- I talked about our Big Picture in spite of Coronavirus, we're doing well as a congregation. #1 is keeping us safe.
  We hired a new Administrator, Margo Ervin, who is replacing Tiffany who just became a mother!
- Jim Danforth reported on our Facilities. This past church year we've upgraded our security and fire alarm system and an AV upgrade is work-in-progress.
- Dick Barton, our Treasurer, led us through a review of this year's church finances and a proposed budget for next church year. We're doing ok for this church year in spite of not having an auction – projecting to be in the red around 1% or so. The congregation passed next year's budget unanimously (!). It includes an increase in Administrator hours to 8 / week, but still no room in the budget for even a part-time Music Director.
- Karen Brock presented the Leadership Development Committee's slate of candidates, which was unanimously (!) approved by the congregation. Sarah Jane Wilhelm and Leonard Sokoloski will be joining the Board; Tom Mitchell, Juana Drake and Fred Schrekinger will be joining CoSM, with Sara Suriani as a continuing member; and Susan Moody and Cherry Sokoloski will be joining LDC. Congratulations to all, and thank you for volunteering to serve.

Coming up, your elected leadership will be meeting in early June (virtually, of course) to discuss 'opening up'. With safety our #1 priority, meeting together physically may still be some ways off. But it will be good to get people's thinking on this – I'll get the word out in July's column on what we come up with. The Big Question is: Can we gather in the fall? To me, that's suddenly seeming awfully soon.

I have to admit that touching base and, harder, figuring out ways to touch base takes more effort and creativity these days. Please do make that effort, though. We are a community that cares about one another and our broader world – how to make it better and live more deeply. I come away inspired every time I brush one of our Namaquan lives. Let's each look for opportunities to do so.

# Religious Education

First off I want to thank everyone who has been able to attend our RE Online Gatherings. It is so fun to see the kids and teens and catch up with their lives. I miss them all and look forward to this interaction. Our next Gathering will be June 14th at the regular time (11:45 a.m.) I will send all families an invitation that morning. We are also looking into the possibility of having an Outdoor RE Movie Night in June but we will have to go through the proper channels to see if this is a possibility yet-- stay tuned and I will keep you posted!

I am also excited about the materials that I will be sending out to families for the month of June. The Theme is Creating Sabbath Space and the following is the Soul Matters introduction to this material.

*Creating Sabbath Space* aims to help families carve out "Sabbath space" in their homes and home life during this time of Covid-19. The weekly packets include guidance for building a home altar ("Chalice Home"), family worship scripts and 2-3 after-worship activities to help families lean into the Sabbath experiences of resting, playing and connecting more deeply with each other.

But what does honoring the sacred look like when we're cut off from our church buildings? "Well, who says you can't build a space for the sacred in your home?" In fact, home worship and home altars are a central part of family life for so many religious traditions. Catholics call them "home shrines." Hindus fill them with their favorite Gods and Goddesses. Buddhists sometimes set aside entire rooms for theirs. Muslims place their prayer rugs in front of theirs. Some UUs, too, have home altars.

While all different, they also share a common goal: To create a space that helps one stay connected to what is sacred and nourishing. And who of us doesn't need that right now?!

So, what might *your* Unitarian Universalist home altar look like? Well that's what we are going to discover and create together.

Each week, you'll get a Sabbath Toolkit with instructions for adding a new piece to your home altar, a family worship service to celebrate that addition and some "after worship activities" to help your family lean into Sabbath rest and connection together.

And here's the super cool thing: Other UU families from across the country will be doing this too! Just like you, UU families from Massachusetts to Indiana to Oklahoma to Oregon will be carving out room in their homes for family altars and weekly Sabbath experiences. Even though we will be physically apart, we'll be spiritually connected.

Then, silver linings galore while staying home...


--Luxurious sleep,

--Taking care of business: refinancing the house, buying a new car, organizing finances and my home study, updating Five Wishes living wills (photo).



## CoSM Notes: NUUC Ministries during the COVID 19 Pandemic

It's natural during these topsy-turvy times to focus on what we don't have. Most notably at Namaqua it's the loss of gathering together, Zooming services with everyone in weird little boxes, no time with our children and youth, canceled programs, no refreshments. So many aspects of our 'normal' church life are missing-- is it a time to mourn?

Maybe not; maybe instead of mourning what we can't have, should we instead be asking ourselves "What are we still doing at Namaqua to insure our beloved community?" and "How am I supporting our congregation?" Of necessity, some of our ministries are not evident right now—most notably Forum (no public meetings in our sanctuary!). But reflect for a minute on what is going on right now despite the pandemic:

- Adult Religious Enrichment -- two virtual Covenant Group well into their 8-session curriculum; exploring two new virtual book clubs (one on racism, the other on stress)
- Buildings and Grounds -- our buildings still being used by members; spring gardening underway; the new video system installed
- Communications—worship services taped and available on our website each week; Crossings newsletter monthly; weekly and special email bursts of latest information
- **Community Building**—Thursday virtual lunches continue with no agendas, just socializing
- Membership—a skills and interest survey will soon be distributed to all members and friends in order to increase our connections
- Music—an evolving approach for next year's music being developed (though Laurel's sabbatical has it on hold during May)
- Pastoral Care—monitoring needs and supporting our members who need help during this complex time
- Social Justice—administering the current year's halfplate ministry; organized special COVID 19 collection for Neighbor to Neighbor, local housing program; soliciting nominations for next year
- Worship—weekly, thoughtful services via Zoom

Youth Religious Exploration—Zoom RE Gatherings twice a month; developing and distributing to parents user-friendly RE lessons from Soul Matters weekly

If you're involved with any of these activities, great and thank you! If not, please join one—or, even better, join a ministry (committee). There's no time like the present—no matter what our present looks like. : )

**Invitation to Apply:** Rev. Laurel and the team of current Worship Associates are recruiting a few new Worship Associates to serve in the 2020-2021 church year. Job Description: Worship Associates are trained lay people who participate in Sunday services in various ways throughout the church year.
