NUUC COVID-19 Response Plan

COVID 19 Task Force will regularly monitor announcements from the Center for Disease Control (www.CDC.gov), Larimer County Health Department (www.Larimer.org/health) and UUA (www.UUA.org) as well as other recognized experts and make recommendations to NUUC Board of Trustees and CoSM on best policies and practices to ensure compliance with Colorado government instructions and recommendations. The Task Force will meet as necessary to review and update NUUC policy and guidelines.

COMMUNICATION

- NUUC's primary communication tools will be our e-mail blast system and the NUUC website www.NamaquaUU.org
- Any member or friend who would like to sign up for email blasts should send a request to Admin@NamaquaUU.org
- Current policy, announcements and information will be posted on the church's website: www.NamaquaUU.org in the Events box at top right on home page. To post an announcement, send notice to nuuc@NamaquaUU.org
- General instructions on church policy and managing contagion will be posted at all church doors
- COVID 19 policy will be distributed with Building Use Guidelines when a member reserves an indoor room for any purpose.

CANCELLING SERVICES and PROGRAMS

- NUUC buildings will remained closed to groups for the foreseeable future; no indoor services, programs or activities will be permitted except as allowed below. Individual members may enter building for essential purposes.
- Virtual services via the internet will be planned by Minister and Worship Associates as technically possible and announcements/instructions made via email blasts and on website
- NUUC programs will be held virtually or outdoors as determined by the lead.
- Outdoor activities must be socially distanced and participants will wear masks.
- Selected children's activities may be held indoors with no more than 20 individuals (adults and children) present. All protective practices must be followed: social distancing, wearing masks, no homemade food; cleaning/ disinfecting. Parent/guardian of any child participating in an indoor activity must sign a NUUC consent form outlining and acknowledging their responsibilities in following church policy.
- As per established NUUC policy, services and programs may be cancelled by consensus of at least two of the following people: Minister, President,

- Chair of COSM, Ministry Chair or program/activity lead
- When services/programs are cancelled, the activity lead will make (or delegate) every effort to contact participants directly by email or phone as well as notice on website as appropriate.
- No outside groups may use the buildings for any purpose.

PROTECTIVE PRACTICES

- Everyone inside the church buildings must wear face masks at all times. The only exception will be the minister and worship associate when conducting services as long as there is only one person in each building (sanctuary and Parker Hall).
- 'Social distancing' will be practiced by staying at least 6' from other individuals when crowd restrictions allow face-to-face gatherings
- Once the building is full, no more will be admitted and must wait in outside grounds still remaining 6' apart; consider holding additional services
- Face masks will be worn by all attendees and the church will provide extra disposable masks in each building
- Cleaning/Disinfecting Surfaces
 - CDC-approved chlorine and alcohol-based (at least 60%) solutions and disposable paper towels will be used after each building use to wipe down all surfaces which may have been touched including pews, tables, chairs, light/ heat switches doorknobs, railings, faucet handles in both kitchen and rest rooms
 - Cleaners should wear protective gloves while cleaning
 - NUUC Janitor will be responsible for weekly cleaning
 - Activity organizer will be responsible for cleaning & disinfecting all surfaces touched during their programs. Cleaning responsibility will be included in Building Use Guidelines.
- Refreshments at services will be limited to commercially wrapped food items and juices. No home-made finger foods will be allowed.
- Disposable dishes and flatware will be used
- Multiple containers of hand-sanitizer, disinfecting wipes/spray will be made available in both sanctuary and Parker Hall as available.
- NUUC staff and volunteers will work remotely as much as possible

CARING FOR EACH OTHER

- Stay home if you are ill.
- If any member/friend would like 'wellness checks' (a church member to call you regularly to stay in touch and reduce social isolation), please contact Pastoral Care Team at <u>PastoralCare@NamaquaUU.org</u> and they will set up a system.

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President's Message

From the Board President

We're now at a full four months plus of virtual Beloved Community and still discovering new and better ways to do it. Let's keep that coming!

I feel like I'm – and we're – getting past the initial scramble and starting to comprehend what the pandemic might mean longer term. Now, maybe we'll get this thing under some semblance of control, like we have with TB, where exposures are rare and we can do contact tracing – or we'll get an effective vaccine sooner rather than later. But it seems wise to me for us to consider and prepare for the long haul, and if better happens, so much the better!

We're taking some nearer-term steps. We've expanded the number of Sunday Service Zoom techs – and can use a couple more, by the way; let me or Sara Suriani know if you have any interest – takes about an hour to learn the ins and outs. (And much thanks to Sara for taking on the bulk of our services to date!)

Pete Buchmeier is investigating getting better internet service in the church building. That might seem an odd thing to do, but some of us have poor service at home which precludes us from hosting the Sunday Services (or should, we've found, from personal experience!). If the Zoom tech could go to the building and have it work great there, that'd be a wonderful alternative.

Programmatically, Janen has led a couple outdoor movie nights at the building, and we're focusing on more small group offerings as a way to stay close. Chad Escallier is facilitating two book discussion groups, and those of us who have read *White Fragility* are doing a follow-on. Laurel is reaching out for interest in new Covenant Groups. And all this is being done over the summertime, our usual slack time.

My advice is to look for small group opportunities that interest you as they become available, and join in; there's something special about being part of a small group. Or, if you might want to offer a new small group opportunity, let our Adult Enrichment chairs know, Elizabeth Fraser and Peter Schenk, and they'll support you in seeing if we can gain a critical mass. I'm eyeing the ecology/sustainability courses offered by ecochallenge.org for Fall. Or join a ministry! Our needs are advertised here in *Crossings*.

But what about the really long haul? I asked the Board to consider what if we're still dealing with this thing 4 years from now. Goodness, I hope not! But if we prepare for that and better happens, no worse for wear, and if that eventuality unfolds, we'll be handling it.

So, suppose we're still dealing with this 4 years from now. How would we want to be doing Beloved Community? Let's start thinking and dreaming about this.

Suppose we can have 10 people in the building. Then we could televise our Sunday Services – maybe a mid-week service too – like Evangelical Christians do. I bet \$1,000 would get us started (anyone with AV interest, see here and let me know what you think).

Or, maybe we buy land! During decent weather, we could have outdoor services – even put up a pavilion so we have a roof over our heads – practicing social distancing all the while. Sit around a bonfire (maybe a propane one, more ecological). A stage for Tim and Bob and who knows who else. Years from now, after this thing has faded in the distance, put up a new building there.

What's your idea? Let me or any Board member know. Let's do some dreaming.

Reflection and Report

"If the stars should appear but one night every thousand years, how people would marvel and stare!" Ralph Waldo Emerson

We live in such a beautiful corner of the world and I'm sure getting outside and being in nature has sustained you during this pandemic as it has me. I once had an extraordinary experience from watching the passing of an ordinary day. This came about because I signed up for a silent meditation retreat weekend at Jackson Hole, Wyoming, not knowing what I was getting myself into. The day began early, long before the sun came up and ended after dark with breaks only for meals and sleep. And they weren't joking about the silent part. Participants weren't even supposed to make *eye contact with anyone else, since that is a form of communication, even during mealtime.*

New to the practice of meditation, I was not good at it; I struggled to clear my mind at the beginning of each new hour and maybe lasted 10 minutes, if that. The rest of the time I was saved by one thing. The room where we sat to meditate was all windows looking out towards the valley and mountains. Since I had to stay on my mat I began paying attention to the details of the passing of the day. I watched the sun come up and cast a golden hue over everything. It seemed like the heat of the day went on for a full eternity before the shadows lengthened and gradually the night closed in. There was a beautiful tree in my view that I came to know intimately since we shared the same occupation of staying in one spot. To be a witness to the passing of a day was a spiritual experience and I never doubted that I was in the presence of the Holy.

Humans have a biological urge to be close to nature. Nature has a unique power to bring balance and harmony into our modern lives. Author Sarah Breathnach says, "Therapists who specialize in 'ecopsychology' believe that deepening our emotional ties to nature is as vital to our well-being as the close personal bonds we pursue with family and friends. We might not consciously understand it but we need to reinforce our strand in the web of life. When we honor this 'holy hunger' by getting in tune with nature we experience personal harmony." I wish this kind of harmony for all of us and our families.

Finally, here is a beautiful piece that participant Barbara Fleming wrote for one of the Spiritual Exercises in the Soul Matters packet on Vision:

Possibility: My Credo

I believe in possibility. The leap of faith required to accept the existence of an unseen, unknowable deity who—or which—somehow controls our destiny asks too much of me. On the other hand, how can I say with certainty that some kind of higher power does not exist? I have seen and experienced the awesome, transcendent power of love and been amazed by genius, gifts far beyond usual human capacity. I have seen too much breathtaking beauty, too many wonders, too many small miracles, to dismiss out of hand the idea of some kind of force beyond ourselves. That leaves me believing in possibility.

I believe in the possibility that human beings might someday draw on our best selves, the god that may reside within each of us, to achieve a sustainable planet, to learn to live peaceably with each other, and to alleviate poverty. I believe in the possibility that nations might someday set aside grievances and age-old grudges and make choices that are in their people's, and the world's, best interests. Cloud Based Membership Software Is In the Works

How this began:

For a few years Namaqua's Membership software has been difficult to use. The company that produced the software no longer supported it, then this spring a Microsoft upgrade stopped access to that program. The software would not open. Through some work-arounds we were able to create a copy and access the data. But, it was clear that we needed a software update for Membership. I got the go ahead at the CoSM meeting which was held by Zoom this spring to move forward on purchasing new software.

I did some research on available church membership software and found several companies which would serve our needs. I asked Reverend Laurel and Doug Stewart if they knew of any software that they might recommend. After viewing the features of several companies, accessing reviews and looking at our finances we settled on Breeze Church Management Software.

Benefits:

Breeze is a cloud based software which allows approved people to access its data from any device. There are several levels of access insuring that members' data is secure. It has several different elements which we can use if we choose to.

In the People section of the software, Members and Friends are listed with their photographs and contact information. On accessing a person's listing you can email or text that person right from the program. Once we are all set up we will be able to send email blasts and newsletters to all members from Breeze. And we can produce a Directory similar to the one we have created in the past using the program.

Breeze has a survey component. Leadership Development Committee has produced a survey which we hope to send out for a trial run soon.

A calendar can be set up in Breeze and attached to our website. We can use this piece to reserve our Zoom room or sometime in the future to reserve Parker Hall. We can list available small groups and classes and use Breeze to sign up participants.

There is a financial component as well. It is not clear at this point that we will use this part of Breeze but it is available if we want to give it a try.

There are many other components of the program that we might consider using. We will need to explore it a bit to see which pieces work for us. The first steps have been made. All membership data is in Breeze along with member photographs. Several members of leadership have access to Breeze and have started to review it. I believe that this program will allow us to use our resources more efficiently and that it can become a valuable asset for Namaqua.

Please expect an email from Breeze soon as a test run. It is possible that the first email from Breeze will land in your spam box. Please check that. It may take a bit of time and effort to work out the kinks but we are on our way.

Board of Trustees Highlights

The Board met virtually via Zoom on July 14, 2020, from 6:30 to 9:00 pm.

The Board's common read for this church year is *Growing A Beloved Community: twelve hallmarks of a healthy congregation* by Tom Owen-Towle. We began by discussing chapter one - Occupy Holy Ground.

Update reports were shared by Rev. Laurel, Sara Suriani and Brian Jarvis for the Committee on Shared Ministry (CoSM) and Kathy Hartman for the Leadership Development Committee (LDC).

Financial Update - Dick Barton

 We ended the fiscal year in the black- substantially in the black when the federal PPP (Paycheck Protection Program) of almost \$21,000 is added in.

Facilities Update - Pete Buchmeier

- Part of our sprinkler system is not functioning properly and will be repaired.
- Because paint has peeled off the decks and ramps in places, Pete proposed that we take the boards off, flip them over and reattach them. The Board asked Pete to follow up on some bids that had been submitted to do this work.
- Pete continues to vet new, more dependable internet providers.

Personnel Update - Doug Stewart

- Our bylaws say we must do a minister evaluation every 3 years. Laurel and the Board have decided to do an
 evaluation every year. This evaluation has been completed for the 2019-2020 year. The key messages from the
 Board feedback to Rev. Laurel were:
 - We feel blessed to have her
 - The Board's #1 priority for her is for her to take care of herself, her spiritual practice and her family, i.e., to be sure to "put her oxygen mask on first" and to delegate.
- We are still looking for a custodian, but do have a possible lead.

(Virtual) General Assembly

- Doug, Rev. Laurel and Kathy shared personal highlights.
- Laurel also shared that NUUC had a total of eight attendees including herself, Doug Stewart, Francey Liefert, Janen Wright, Elizabeth Fraser, Margo Ervin, Kathy Hartman, and Sally Henry. The group met after GA ended to talk about how GA takeaways and topics will be infused in services throughout year.

 The Board continues to monitor the coronavirus pandemic and concomitant guidelines via the recently established Covid-19 Task Force.
