## NUUC COVID-19 Response Plan

COVID 19 Task Force will regularly monitor announcements from the Center for Disease Control (<a href="www.CDC.gov">www.CDC.gov</a>), Larimer County Health Department (<a href="www.Larimer.org/health">www.Larimer.org/health</a>) and UUA (<a href="www.UUA.org">www.UUA.org</a>) as well as other recognized experts and make recommendations to NUUC Board of Trustees and CoSM on best policies and practices to ensure compliance with Colorado government instructions and recommendations. The Task Force will meet as necessary to review and update NUUC policy and guidelines.

### **COMMUNICATION**

- NUUC's primary communication tools will be our e-mail blast system and the NUUC website www.NamaquaUU.org
- Any member or friend who would like to sign up for email blasts should send a request to Admin@NamaquaUU.org
- Current policy, announcements and information will be posted on the church's website: www.NamaquaUU.org in the Events box at top right on home page. To post an announcement, send notice to nuuc@NamaquaUU.org
- General instructions on church policy and managing contagion will be posted at all church doors
- COVID 19 policy will be distributed with Building Use Guidelines when a member reserves an indoor room for any purpose.

#### **CANCELLING SERVICES and PROGRAMS**

- NUUC buildings will remained closed to groups for the foreseeable future; no indoor services, programs or activities will be permitted except as allowed below. Individual members may enter building for essential purposes.
- Virtual services via the internet will be planned by Minister and Worship Associates as technically possible and announcements/instructions made via email blasts and on website
- NUUC programs will be held virtually or outdoors as determined by the lead.
- Outdoor activities must be socially distanced and participants will wear masks.
- Selected children's activities may be held indoors with no more than 20 individuals (adults and children) present. All protective practices must be followed: social distancing, wearing masks, no homemade food; cleaning/ disinfecting. Parent/guardian of any child participating in an indoor activity must sign a NUUC consent form outlining and acknowledging their responsibilities in following church policy.
- As per established NUUC policy, services and programs may be cancelled by consensus of at least two of the following people: Minister, President,

- Chair of COSM, Ministry Chair or program/activity lead
- When services/programs are cancelled, the activity lead will make (or delegate) every effort to contact participants directly by email or phone as well as notice on website as appropriate.
- No outside groups may use the buildings for any purpose.

#### **PROTECTIVE PRACTICES**

- Everyone inside the church buildings must wear face masks at all times. The only exception will be the minister and worship associate when conducting services as long as there is only one person in each building (sanctuary and Parker Hall).
- 'Social distancing' will be practiced by staying at least 6' from other individuals when crowd restrictions allow face-to-face gatherings
- Once the building is full, no more will be admitted and must wait in outside grounds still remaining 6' apart; consider holding additional services
- Face masks will be worn by all attendees and the church will provide extra disposable masks in each building
- Cleaning/Disinfecting Surfaces
  - CDC-approved chlorine and alcohol-based (at least 60%) solutions and disposable paper towels will be used after each building use to wipe down all surfaces which may have been touched including pews, tables, chairs, light/ heat switches doorknobs, railings, faucet handles in both kitchen and rest rooms
  - Cleaners should wear protective gloves while cleaning
  - NUUC Janitor will be responsible for weekly cleaning
  - Activity organizer will be responsible for cleaning & disinfecting all surfaces touched during their programs. Cleaning responsibility will be included in Building Use Guidelines.
- Refreshments at services will be limited to commercially wrapped food items and juices. No home-made finger foods will be allowed.
- Disposable dishes and flatware will be used
- Multiple containers of hand-sanitizer, disinfecting wipes/spray will be made available in both sanctuary and Parker Hall as available.
- NUUC staff and volunteers will work remotely as much as possible

#### **CARING FOR EACH OTHER**

- Stay home if you are ill.
- If any member/friend would like 'wellness checks' (a church member to call you regularly to stay in touch and reduce social isolation), please contact Pastoral Care Team at <u>PastoralCare@NamaquaUU.org</u> and they will set up a system.

September, and our 'real' church year starts after our summer hiatus. I hope, in spite of it all, you've had a good summer!

Only, not much has changed! We'll still be meeting "virtually" (we've had a few exceptions – it was good to get to the park for a couple of Sundays over the summer, for Nancy's memorial service and for the drumming service). I must say, I miss the physical closeness of seeing how many people we can comfortably fit in a pew. All in time, I suppose.

But we're a flexible bunch. I've noticed I'm slowly getting better with the technology. Sara Suriani provided a Zoom tip that's helped me reduce 'Zoom fatigue' – you can turn off 'self view' by hovering over your picture and clicking on the '...' – this brings up a menu that lets you do that, the bottom option I think it is. Amazing how that little thing helps – I'd been unconsciously putting a lot of energy into watching myself! Turning off my image on my screen makes the meeting feel more normal.

Just in time, too, as due to popular demand we've just added a second Zoom Room. You can reserve one of these for your meeting by making a request to calendar@namquauu.org. Thanks to Karen Dornseif for continuing to coordinate our calendar, often surprising me with her promptness.

We're getting more people trained up as 'Zoom Techs', to help the Sunday services go smoothly – but still need a couple more people to take turns. If you've an interest in getting better at Zoom, Sara does a great 45-minute training – let her know if you'd be willing.

We're also nudging our technology forward with new church management software, called Breeze, initiated by Alice Cain's need to track our membership in a friendly way. The software holds great promise, well beyond Membership ministry's needs. We'll be experimenting with it awhile and no doubt occasionally stepping on one another's toes as we explore how to use its capabilities, again exercising our flexibility muscles. It holds great promise — we may, for example, be able to get our directory on-line and "live" for access by all members and friends, and move email blasts from the rather cumbersome and slow method we use now. It'll take some exploring, though, by several hands, so please bear with.

### Board goings on:

- Sarah Jane agreed to be our "point person" for Personnel matters thank you Sarah! The Board has been acting as a 'committee of the whole' on Personnel matters for the past year, and having someone with Sarah's talents to direct our attention will be Goodness.
- After a bit of a hiatus, we should have a custodian to keep the church tidy by the time you read this, reducing
  our cleaning cycle from weekly when we were meeting to every two weeks or so.
- Our finances appear to be in decent shape. The Board approved an increase in administrative hours from 8 to 10 per week, on average, as Margo has taken on check-writing and more web work, especially with Karen Brock going overseas; we'll miss Karen!

As I said, I hope everyone had a good summer, in spite of it all. Now that we're 'back', I'd like to encourage each of us to get involved in at least one smaller 'group interaction' – a class, for example, or (at least) one of our ministries. Those interactions build purpose and meaning, and I'm surprised at how fulfilling it is to get out of my shell a bit. We're a lovely bunch, each special, each a gift.

## Minister's Musings



More than Human Doings

Nothing is harder to do than nothing.

From How To Do Nothing: Resisting the Attention Economy by Jenny Odell

Dear Ones,

Was it one of you who sent me this book? It was an anonymous gift, and when I started to read the introduction - *Nothing is harder to do than nothing. In a world where our value is* 

determined by our productivity - the bells were ringing.

Yes, I've been taught, like many of you, to believe that my value is determined by my productivity. When I've taken time off, like for vacation or study leave, I've assumed that the point was so that I could return to work refreshed and ready to be more productive. But Odell is questioning what we currently perceive as productive. She warns of the dangers of busyness. As did the American Trappist monk, writer, and activist Thomas Merton, in even stronger words:

There is a pervasive form of contemporary violence... [and that is] activism and overwork. The rush and pressure of modern life are a form, perhaps the most common form, of its innate violence.

To allow oneself to be carried away by a multitude of conflicting concerns, to surrender to too many demands, to commit oneself to too many projects, to want to help everyone in everything, is to succumb to violence.

The frenzy of our activism neutralizes our work for peace. It destroys our own inner capacity for peace. It destroys the fruitfulness of our own work, because it kills the root of inner wisdom which makes work fruitful.

During my short sabbatical in May, I was actually able to disengage from my activism and overwork. I found that I cherished my early morning walks at Mehaffey Park, memorizing poetry by David Whyte, John O'Donohue, Joy Harjo, Thich Nhat Hanh, Mary Oliver, Billy Collins. I was surprised how much I enjoyed the luxury of being unscheduled and inefficient, no daily "to do" list, no deadlines. Even though I'm now back at work, I get up early enough to maintain my morning walks, not to be productive and useful, but simply because I love doing it. Morning walks and poetry feed my soul.

This is also one way to explain why people like me go to church. Or here's another way to put it from this year's common read for Namaqua's elected leaders called <u>Growing A Beloved Community: twelve hallmarks of a healthy congregation</u> by Tom Owen-Towle:

Microsoft chairman Bill Gates brags that "he doesn't go to church because it isn't an efficient use of time." Gates is right, if efficiency means simply making more money, cranking out a product, or grabbing quick pleasure. But there are many in modern society who hunger for renewal beyond efficiency and for meaning beyond machines — who desperately want to be human beings, not merely human doings. And that process requires religion. The holy is seldom efficient, but it is oh so sustaining.

Yes, it is oh so sustaining.

Namaqua UU Congregation's History: the Rest of the Story

An interim minister, Rev. Todd Strickland, served the congregation following Rev. Forde's departure. After meeting at the Community of Christ church for a time, NUUC moved again. Eventually the time came to search for a fulltime minister; Rev. Laurel Liefert was installed at Foothills Unitarian Church on February 26, 2012. The next step toward becoming an established church in Loveland, owning our own building, happened three years later when funds were secured to purchase the 100-year-old church at 5th and Pierce streets in Loveland as our first home. Five years ago this coming November we moved in. Plans had been underway to celebrate the 20th anniversary of the founding of this congregation when almost every aspect of our customary church life was put on hold by the pandemic.
