President's Message

May flowers bring... Laurel back from her sabbatical! We're all looking forward to seeing her again. Her love for us is palpable, and it goes both ways. Also starting May 1st is our new (and first!) ministerial intern, clare hammoor! Welcome, clare!!! We're so glad to have you join us in journeying together.

The plan is **clare will be with us part-time for just over 2 years**, gaining a deep sense of parish ministry in order to become a Fellowshipped UU Minister. This, while working full-time in school administration *and* going to Illif School of Theology in Denver part-time. And did I mention his involvement with the Colorado prison system? **You've got to see this video**; clare directed this, putting his PhD in educational theatre to very good use. We're looking forward to a dynamo of a time together!

Laurel has long wanted to enrich a ministerial student with what she wonderfully brings to parish ministry, including doing shared ministry so well. The barrier has been funding. But with Laurel going to ¾ time for next church year, and her finding a grant that'll pay for half of clare's salary, the Board agrees we can do this and Namaqua can become a Teaching Congregation. We've formed a strong Internship Committee to assist Laurel (and the rest of us) in making clare's experience with us rich indeed.

Those riches will be of our hearts – and of course, to enable those, we need to rely on financial riches too. **Much thanks to Bill Rosquist and Mickey McGuire for leading our Annual Budget Drive! And thank you, thank you, to those who pledged** to donate for the upcoming church year, which starts July 1st – your pledges enable our Treasurer, Dick Barton, and the Board to propose next year's budget to the congregation. There are still a few folks who usually pledge who we're following up with, to see if they're willing and able to pledge again; Dick is confident he'll be able to propose a solid budget.

This agrees with my own, much less informed, sense – but unless we get some unexpected manna from heaven, I think we're unlikely to afford a music director, a gleam in my eye, costing at least \$5k. Still, we'll be able to pay our staff fairly, gain clare as our first ministerial intern (with the help of the grant), and perhaps increase the administrator's time, which is much needed, if Margo can balance an increased workload with the rest of life. We've paid down our building loan and now owe only \$17k.

Dick will get the proposed budget in front of the Board in May, and we'll take it to the congregation in the **Sunday May 23rd Congregational Meeting**, which starts at 11:30 via Zoom right after the service. We'll also gain brief reports on the state of our Beloved Community and vote on our elected positions.

Our church building is almost ready to reopen, as soon as our Covid task force says it's safe to do so; maybe Fall? The furnace is now working and Pete Buchmeier has final repairs underway to restore water from the pipes having frozen and split – which has meant no bathroom facilities in Parker Hall. Meanwhile, the **Hybrid Service task force** has been hard at work; when we do reopen for in-person services, we're also wanting to continue our on-line Zoom presence. The main bottleneck there has been our internet speed, and Don Suriani may have come up with an affordable solution – stay tuned!



Introducing our New Members


Arthur Goldsipe

Board of Trustees



The Board met virtually via Zoom on April 13, 2021.

The Board continued their discussion of this church year's common read: *Growing A Beloved Community: Twelve Hallmarks of a Healthy Congregation* by Tom Owen-Towle.

Update reports were shared by Brian Jarvis for the Committee on Shared Ministries (CoSM) and Cherry Sokoloski for the Leadership Development Committee (LDC).

Hybrid Service Task Force Report – Dick Barton & Pete Buchmeier for the Task Force

NUUC would like to conduct Sunday services both in the sanctuary and virtually. From a tech standpoint the critical component is bandwidth. At present the church's *uploading* bandwidth is much too narrow for transmitting service from the sanctuary. Loveland internet providers focus on *download* bandwidth and not upload bandwidth because the demand for *download* capability is greater.

Possible Solutions:

Short Term -

- 1. Use the present remote Zoom Rooms to transmit the services from the church using a smaller transmission of the services via a WiFi and cell tower to the Zoom Room. This will be tested within the next 2 weeks. IF that is not a viable system, we could also have a small coaxial cable installed to the church by Comcast. Cost \$85/month for 24 months, \$2,040.
- 2. Have Comcast install a large 300 MBs coaxial cable to the church. It would provide Zoom capability without the need for the remote Zoom Room. Cost \$200/month for 24 months, \$4,800

Long term -

1. Wait for Pulse to be connected. Cost unknown at this time, but it will require equipment in the church. Best estimate for 50Mbs is \$60-80/month.

Equipment used in the short term solutions would have to be replaced to do the long term solution. Pulse is providing a fiberoptic system that has the same download and upload capacity.

For the long term we will want to have a fiber optic system.

Financial Update – Dick Barton

Operating budget summary: income down a bit this month; but up \$6K for the 3rd quarter. Our building loan payment of \$16,667 was made in March.

Annual Budget Drive - Bill Rosquist and Mickey McGuire, co-chairs

A total of 81 of the 103 pledging units returned pledges amounting to \$131,560. Seven of 42 friends returned pledges for a total of \$5630, which brought the grand total of the Annual Budget Drive to \$137,190 or 91% of the goal set by the Board of \$150,000.

Facilities Update - Pete Buchmeier

There is still a plumbing issue in the basement because of the broken pipes from the BIG freeze in March. Pete will be working on this in order to get the water back on in the social hall. Next up will be getting the sprinkler system up and running. Finally, there needs to be an assessment of how we might fix this so the pipes don't burst again during a deep winter freeze.

Furnace is up, running and working just fine.

Internship Committee Update – Rebecca Williamson, co-chair of the Internship Committee

Social Justice Corner: Together Colorado

Laurel has long been meeting with a group of progressive clergy in our area, and they often connect with a state-wide interfaith social justice organization, *Together Colorado*, through its director Mike Kromrey, who drives up from Denver. In 2017 Together Colorado and several of the clergy sponsored an organizing meeting for a local branch, centered in Loveland.

Community-level first, then the state. Namaqua is one of 4 congregations active in our local branch, which also includes Saint John's Catholic, 1st Presbyterian, and United Church of Christ members. After gaining feedback from 500 congregational members and neighbors, we decided we could make a difference in **addressing homelessness here in the Loveland area**.

We are making a difference to better address homelessness, an incredibly complex challenge. In December 2019 we sponsored a community meeting which included the mayor and several city council members – **that's Laurel speaking from the pulpit** – to emphasize to our city government the importance our community attaches to this issue.

While direct services to the homeless such as food and shelter are critical, our branch is working with our city government toward **systemic change**, starting with the city sponsoring a **lead agency** to coordinate responses to homelessness. It looks like this is going to happen – we'll let you know if contacting our City Council members will help.



If you'd like to check out the local branch's work on systemically addressing homelessness, let me know. We meet monthly.

At the state level, *Together Colorado* advocates for many social issues, including Climate, Health, and Economic justice. For Affordable Housing, we're working with other non-profits to pass legislation to codify late-rent fees (which are unregulated and sometimes terribly abused, causing unnecessary evictions), and to allow local governments to require affordable housing in new housing developments, ruled as illegal under the current law we're trying to change. For Criminal Justice, *Together Colorado* is leading legislation to regulate stand-ups (a one -person line up[!]), brought to our attention by the wrongful arrest of one of our member's sons. Who happens to be a person of color. You can be part of these legislative efforts, by signing up for action alerts here – a super easy way to contact your state legislator when it can make a difference.

Underlying all of *Together Colorado's* work is to intentionally address the predominate **race-class narrative**. We'll likely offer some workshops at Namaqua inspired by their work.

Being involved in *Together Colorado*, either locally or at the state level, is **a way to reach across faiths and find common ground to better our world**. King Soopers Grocery Cards

To do that:

- 3. Once you have signed into your account, hover over "My Account" (under your name in the top right corner of the page), then click on My Account in the drop-down menu.
- 4. On the left side of the page is a list of links. Under "My Account", click on the last link titled *Community Rewards*.
- 5. Search for Namaqua Unitarian Universalist Congregation and then click Enroll.
