Join us for an exploration of memories, missed opportunities, and hope inspired by Stephen Sondheim's song "Sorry - Grateful" in *Company* and clare's journey with his father's early-onset Parkinson's diagnosis.

June 27: General Assembly Sunday Morning Worship - Rev. Laurel Liefert & First Universalist Church of Minneapolis

Join us for the largest annual gathering of UUs for a powerful communal worship experience. Recognizing the importance of shared ministry and the many innovative approaches to worship created by congregations during the pandemic, UUA President, Rev. Dr. Susan Frederick Gray, selected the <u>First Universalist Church of Minneapolis</u> to serve as worship leaders for this year's GA Sunday Morning Service. First Universalist has been a model of shared ministry and what it means to put the work of dismantling white supremacy and building anti-racist, anti-oppressive practices at the center of their ministry. They have been on the front lines in support of the Movement for Black Lives in Minneapolis, bringing spiritual care and moral leadership in the wake of George Floyd's murder by police and the important uprisings for justice that followed. Children and families are a vital part of their ministry, and they have been using creative approaches to engage all ages in worship during the pandemic. Their leadership exemplifies some of the best practices for the creativity, spiritual depth, and moral leadership that is **possible when we embrace the work of shared ministry rooted in love and justice.**

President's Message

As I write we've just held our annual Spring Congregational Meeting. Thank you to all who attended and participated!

For those who couldn't make it, we'll send meeting notes for the details. Here I'll give a couple of highlights, from a Board perspective, as we wind down this church year and look forward to the next one, which starts July 1st. In the Congregational Meeting, we:

- Outlined the plans for Laurel's retirement and transition to a next called minister:
 - o 2021-22: Savor Laurel's last year and hire an interim minister
 - o 2022-23 or -24: Interim minister helps us find a match with a new called minister
 - o 2023 or -24: Summer, welcome our new called minister!
- Thanked outgoing Board members Jessie Allen-Young, Rebecca Williamson and myself
- Elected incoming Board members. As of July 1st, the new Board will be:
 - Sarah Jane Wilhelm (President)
 - Sally Henry (Vice-president) newly elected
 - Dick Barton (Treasurer)
 - Nance Horowitz (Secretary) newly elected
 - Pete Buchmeier (at large)
 - o Glenn Pease (at large) newly elected
 - Leonard Sokolowski (at large)
- Approved the proposed budget, which includes:
 - Our first intern minister, clare hammoor, part-time!
 - o Additional administrative hours, from 10 to 12 per week
 - And a new position, a quarter-time music director!!!

The **budget** the Board proposed had an interesting twist. While we're projecting to run a surplus this church year, for the first time in Dick's or my memory, **the Board proposed a 'deficit' budget**, of around \$8k, with more expenses than income. But the Board, and now the Congregation, is **comfortable with doing so**, I think for several reasons. We'll have funds from our surplus and a PPP grant, and Glenda Bell showed her love for us by bequeathing the bulk of her estate to us, which we expect to be around \$95k. We won't want to spend that bequest on ongoing operating expenses, but between these they give us considerable freedom to try new adventures, to **spread our outreach and attract others to us**; the intern minister is an example. And the music director may attract more people – a good investment, we think, and an enriching one. I'm glad the congregation agreed with the Board.

We also **thanked outgoing leaders of the Committee on Shared Ministry, Sara Suriani and Brian Jarvis**. A big thankyou to both of them for seeing our programs through 'the year of the Pandemic'! We more than survived – with stimulating Sunday Services, education for children, youth and adults (thanks in no small part to Janen!), very active Pastoral Care (with funds that, thanks to the congregation, increased) – with these and more, with their leadership we showed how we enact Beloved Community.

I've served on the Board 4 years and have been blessed to work so closely with such wonderful members and staff. I'll be moving over to CoSM and looking forward to that adventure. **Thanks to all** for our common efforts to build beloved community. **Our journey together continues!**

Practicing Presence



Every day I try to find opportunities to be more present with other people and the world around me by engaging my whole body and mind within the time that we share. I love when that means running and dancing together in rehearsal as much as I love when it means dreaming up new worlds and provocations in a brainstorm. I love when that means imagining what was and what could be in a one-on-one conversation as much as I love when it means full-body movement, singing, and holding space with people in worship. I know that presence is an ongoing practice

— it's hard work to stay in the fantastic now. So I thought it would be useful for me and hopefully engaging for you to think about practicing presence through the body and mind. Over the next two years, I am looking forward to creating this monthly column as an investigation into ways of becoming more fully alive in the present through practices of embodiment and imagination.

In *The Body Keeps the Score: Brain, Mind, and Body in the Healing of Trauma* psychiatrist Bessel van der Kolk grounds the work of therapy and the hope of change in the body, where so much meaning is inscribed and created. He writes: "In order to change, people need to become aware of their sensations and the way that their bodies interact with the world around them. Physical self-awareness is the first step in releasing the tyranny of the past." Each month, I will work to share a new way of developing physical self-awareness and the impact it is having on my life. I hope we'll find opportunities to discuss the ways this work impacts your life as well — look out for a workshop on this idea.

Van der Kolk also writes about the wondrous power of imagination in *The Body Keeps the Score:* "Imagination is absolutely critical to the quality of our lives. Our imagination enables us to leave our routine everyday existence by fantasizing about travel, food, sex, falling in love, or having the last word—all the things that make life interesting. Imagination gives us the opportunity to envision new possibilities—it is an essential launchpad for making our hopes come true. It fires our creativity, relieves our boredom, alleviates our pain, enhances our pleasure, and enriches our most intimate relationships." For me, a lack of imagination can feel much like a sickness in my body — dense, stagnant, and not particularly inviting. As I share ideas for embodiment in this column, I will also bring challenges for our imaginations which can spring to life in our everyday existences.

If you're interested in van der Kolk's work beyond *The Body Keeps the Score,* I'd suggest listening to <u>this stellar</u> <u>episode</u> of *On Being* where he is interviewed by Krista Tippett. If you'd rather read than listen, scroll down the page to read the full transcript of their conversation.

I'm looking forward to writing into thinking and creating into practicing with this column — I hope you'll join me on the journey.

Minister's Musings



Sad & Glad, Glad & Sad

What follows is the text of the announcement that was sent out on May 15th. Many of you haven't responded, perhaps because you haven't heard yet or fully comprehended that your longest-serving minister will be retiring after the upcoming 2021-2022 church year. However, the few people I've heard from have communicated remarkably similar sentiments – "I'm sad and I'm glad." "I'm glad and I'm sad." Sad that I'm leaving Namaqua. Glad that we've had 10 wonderful years together. Glad for me and my family that I'm retiring and moving back to California. Sad that our time together will end. Glad

that I'm staying one more year.

I hope you know that I feel the same way. I'm sad and I'm glad. I'm glad and I'm sad. So here is my bittersweet announcement.

Dear Ones,

The time has come for me to retire. Both Francey and I turned 70 in 2020. To retire at the end of this 2020-2021 church year, my 10th serving as Namaqua's minister, the 20th anniversary of Namaqua joining the Association of Unitarian Universalist congregations, seemed like good timing. But then came COVID. I could not bear the thought of leaving when it has been a challenging year being physically apart, more than a year since we've been together in our church home. So here's my revised plan.

The next church year – July 1, 2021-June 30, 2022 – will be my last year serving as your minister. Francey and I are putting our Loveland house on the market at the end of this month. Once it sells, we will see what we can afford in the Bay Area. Both of our sons, Marcus and David, plus our grandson Henry, are all there now. The pull of family is so strong. Francey will move to California this summer.

I have rented an apartment at Lincoln Place, close to the church, through June 2022. I will be working ¾time, so I will be spending some of my time off in California. Francey will also be coming back here for visits.

I'm thrilled that my unfulfilled dream of Namaqua having an intern has come true this year. An internship is one of the most transformative experiences for seminary students who are on the path to become fellowshipped UU ministers. Our ministerial intern clare hammoor feels like such a good match for Namaqua, as his teaching congregation, and for me, as his supervisor. He will be with Namaqua part -time for two years, which means he will still be with you, along with an Interim Minister, for the first year after I leave.

Doug's email explains more about Namaqua's path forward. I know that you will be more than fine.

There's much more to say. About how my ministry with Namaqua has been one of the most magical and meaningful times in my life. I cannot imagine a more important calling, especially now, than what we have been doing together - growing a Beloved Community.

I look forward to all that lies ahead in our last year together.

Board of Trustees Highlights

The Board met virtually via Zoom on May 11, 2021.

The Board continued their discussion of this church year's common read: *Growing A Beloved Community: Twelve Hallmarks of a Healthy Congregation* by Tom Owen-Towle.

Update reports were shared by Brian Jarvis for the Committee on Shared Ministries (CoSM) and Susan Moody for the Leadership Development Committee (LDC).

Financial Update – Dick Barton

- We have received approximately \$30K of the Glenda Bell endowment. We are expecting the remainder of the bequest of approximately \$60K in the next week or so. A question for next board meeting: How do we invest the \$90+K endowment from Glenda?
- One more mortgage payment is due in March 2022. The church building will then be ours!

Annual Budget

- The projected 2021-22 budget:
 - Income = \$170,000.
 - Expenses = \$178,024.
- The biggest proportion of budget goes toward staff salaries and benefits. All staff will receive a raise.
- There was a lively discussion on whether we should/could hire a music director. The Board voted to hire a music director at ¼ time.

Hybrid Service Task Force Update – Dick Barton & Pete Buchmeier for the Task Force

- We now have a method for using a hotspot from the church which will allow Zooming from the church and compensate for the low upload bandwidth.
- Pete has a name of a local fellow who has expertise in doing virtual services for churches that he will be contacting.

Coronavirus Task Force Update – Sally Henry

• We have officially opened our building to Namaqua people only. The only restriction is 6 foot social distancing. (There is no need for masking indoors if 80% of the people are vaccinated.)

Facilities Update – Pete Buchmeier

- Pete has purchased the parts needed to repair plumbing. The "what to do as a long-term fix" discussion was tabled for next board meeting.
- Spigots and sprinklers will be repaired so that they are ready to go for summer. Also, we need to organize a work party to not only clean out the detritus from the basement due to the flooding but also clean up the building grounds.

Next Board meeting scheduled for June 8, at 6:30 pm – via Zoom (probably- but not necessarily) Respectfully submitted by Rebecca Williamson, Board of Trustees Secretary.

ADDENDUM A

NUUC COVID Plan, Version 6 (Updated 5/6/21)

- Individuals are permitted to remove their masks in indoor spaces if 80% of the individuals in the space have been vaccinated, even if there are 10 or more unvaccinated individuals in the space.
- Outdoor activities must be socially distanced and participants will wear masks. Outdoor events utilizing a single venue or area, but with less than 500 attendees at one time are not required to register an event plan.

King Soopers Grocery Cards

However, you must designate NUUC as your Community Rewards recipient on the King Soopers web site. To do that:

- 1. Go to kingsoopers.com.
- 2. If you've already been on the site, sign in to your account. If you have not visited the site before, go to <u>kingsoopers.com/signin?redirectUrl=/</u> and click on the *Create an Account* link at the bottom of the page, next to "New to King Soopers?" You will be asked for some basic information, a valid email address, and your King Soopers reward number. If you do not have a King Soopers rewards card, they are available at the customer service desk at any King Soopers.
- 3. Once you have signed into your account, hover over "My Account" (under your name in the top right corner of the page), then click on <u>My Account</u> in the drop-down menu.
- 4. On the left side of the page is a list of links. Under "My Account", click on the last link titled *Community Rewards*.
- 5. Search for Namaqua Unitarian Universalist Congregation and then click Enroll.
