Religious Education



A good definition of suffering, that comes from the Buddhist tradition, is needing things to be different. To the extent that we need things to be different we will suffer. So if gratitude is about being aware of all the good in our life and even about accepting that we can gain from hardshipbeing grateful is the opposite of suffering and can strengthen us through hard times.

Rev. Galen encourages a daily practice of gratitude as a spiritual way of engaging with the world. He says, "In my view, religion is constituted by two distinct but related impulses: a sense of awe and a sense of obligation. The feeling of awe emerges from our experience of the grandeur of life and the mystery of the divine. This feeling becomes religious when a sense of obligation lays claim to us, and we feel a duty to the larger life that we share.

Rev Galen says "unless our faith is mere intellectual affectation, the defining element of our faith must be a daily practice of some kind." He promises, "If you are hungry for a more steady emotional rhythm in a world that seems hectic or overwrought, taking seriously a discipline of gratitude and an awareness of our profound interdependence is a profoundly worthwhile practice." I have certainly found it to be so.

Practicing Presence



Throughout the
Coronavirus Pandemic,
many folks have learned
the joys of relaxing at
home. Busy lives creeped
to a halt for a few
months and for many

months since, we've all been carefully venturing out again. Thanks to a newfound understanding of home life, many of us have fallen into the comfort of home-focused clothes. Clothes that make us feel relaxed. Clothes that make us feel cozy. Clothes that we aren't too worried about.

I discovered a love of athleisurewear — athletic clothes which are sturdy enough to work out in yet just sophisticated enough to wear to the grocery or even on a travel day. Comfortable thick -soled gym shoes pair well with a hoodie and athletic pants. Relaxed to the max. Putting on these clothes wasn't about challenging myself or creating an outward identity or better understanding who I am. Those clothes were a balm for the wild world around me.

The drag icon RuPaul is known for his bespoke tailored suits and the passion with which he speaks about their power. In his MasterClass, which I watched during the long days of the pandemic, he spoke directly to the camera, directly to me and said: "Put yourself together. People respond to it."

My inner monologue retorted: I should be able to wear whatever I want!

And that's true.

I can wear whatever I want.

But the more I thought about it, the more I realized that I enjoy putting a simple outfit together.

I enjoy the presence I hold within myself when I put myself together.

And people do respond to it.

So I returned to my black jeans and sweaters.

But added the thick-soled gym shoes.

I began to throw blazers back over my t-shirts for meetings.

And dug my watch out of a drawer.

I began to rediscover the many benefits of putting myself together. Not overdoing it or overthinking each part of my outfit. But stepping into myself more fully through the clothes I choose to wear. In his hit musical Hello, Dolly! Jerry Herman writes:

"Out there, full of shine and full of sparkle

Close your eyes and see it glisten, Barnaby

Listen, Barnaby...

Put on your Sunday clothes,

There's lots of world out there"

There is a lot of world out there and the more I find myself inhabiting it, the more comfortable I am with myself and with other people. RuPaul is also known for reminding us that: "Everyone is born naked. Everything else is drag." Everything we put on each day is a way of performing ourselves for ourselves and for the world around us.

My wardrobe journey through the pandemic aligns with my understanding of my own spiritual journey. There's nothing wrong with relaxing and letting it all go sometimes. But I feel like my best self when I pull it together. When I put on my Sunday clothes, I do realize how much world there is. And people respond to it. That dynamic relationship is as useful in my clothes as it is in pastoral care. Caring for myself is a way of caring for the world around me.

Celebration & Closure

Dear Ones,

If you attended the October 24th service – *Keeping the Flame Alive with guest preacher Robert T. Latham – you may recognize the title*

of this month's Minister's Musing. In his informative and exhilarating sermon, Robert described Namaqua's path ahead as a three-phase process, calling the first phase "Celebration and Closure." This is the phase we are in right now, a time to savor the remaining months we have together.

Robert listed some of the many things we have accomplished in our partnership of shared ministry these past ten years. Then here's what he said:

I have been in the professional ministry for seventy-two years and during that time I have been a full-time minister, an interim minister, a special project minister, a district executive, and a church consultant and I know success when I see it — and you have done something of profound excellence here and I congratulate you for its doing.

You saw the burning bush. You engaged its vision. You entered the promised land. You built a temple. And you housed it with both professional and lay visionary leadership. What an accomplishment!

Yes, my friends, what an accomplishment! Robert sees Namaqua now (at age 21) as a fully grown-up religious institution, able to do anything you set your vision to do, able to become whoever you want to become. He posed the immediate question: Who do you want to be between now and the time Laurel ceases being your minister?

Here are a few of the things he recommended we do:

- -Do some relationship analysis and ask yourself why it has been successful on the part of both minister and congregation. Why did you click? What might this speak to your future congregation/minister relationship?
- -List all your major successes and determine how you can celebrate them. Congratulate yourselves but with a spirit of humility which recognizes that it has taken the entire congregation, whatever the individual contributions, to have created such grand success.

We will have opportunities to look more closely at what we can do together in this final year. We can have conversations about how to have a healthy closure of our relationship, a rare and wonderful thing, and then do it. Soon leadership will begin preparing for your second phase – the interim period – when Namaqua will be in a time of transition between settled ministers. The interim minister will start in August 2022. Robert sees this interim transition time as the most important moment in the life of a religious institution - because it determines the nature of your future.

If you missed being at the October 24th service, I suggest you take the time to watch it. You can find the video of the service posted in the Archive section of the Worship tab on our website – namaquauu.org.

After the Sunday service about keeping the flame alive, we held our Fall Congregational meeting. The Listening Activity was townhall-style, featuring over an hour of Robert answering questions posed by the congregation.

The meeting also held a big surprise that wasn't on the Agenda. Kathy Hartman announced the surprise and then read a proclamation: whereas...whereas...

They volunteered driving both me and my son, for meals and repairs and visits and errands and company and compassionate therapeutic touch and encouragement. So that's working quite well.

How was the food, you might wonder? Would people bring leftovers and old frozen goods from the back of the freezer? Oh no. Great soups and main dishes and pastas and salads and pastries and

desserts. I got self-sufficient way too soon and when I do my second blind test (my right knee) I'll check the food category so much more thoroughly. Early reports are great tho.

And remedies: do you have any idea the variety of commercial and natural responses to constipation – caused by pain medication? I was blessed with prune, apple and pomegranate juices, psyllium and flax seeds, Smooth Move tea, Miralax, Milk of Magnesia, Dulcolax, Senokot and more than one home remedy recipe. The meals are prepared by Meals on Wheels but they are packaged and distributed as take-out or can be eaten in the dining room. The Community Kitchen is located at 427 Garfield Ave. (4th and Garfield) right behind Meals on Wheels.

Namaqua UU supports the Kitchen by sending a team of 7 kindhearted volunteers on the 4th Friday, every other month. We actively participate in set up, food preparation, serving, and clean up....on our feet from 4:00-7:00pm.

COVID-19 Response Plan



This plan is updated in accordance with Colorado Department of Public Health and Environment Public Health Order dated May 31, 2021.

regularly monitor announcements from the Center for Disease Control (www.CDC.gov), Larimer County Health Department (www.larimer.org/health) and UUA (www.UUA.org) as well as other recognized experts and make recommendations to NUUC Board of Trustees and CoSM on best policies and practices to ensure compliance with Colorado government instructions and recommendations. The Task Force will meet as necessary to review and update NUUC policy and guidelines.

MASK REQUIRED

- Everyone meeting indoors for NUUC activities must wear face masks at all times regardless of vaccination status. The only exception will be the minister and worship associate when conducting services.
- There is no need to wear masks for outdoor activities.
- NUUC staff and members are encouraged to follow good health practices including frequent & thorough hand-washing.

CLEANING/DISINFECTING SURFACES

- Routine cleaning with usual household cleansers is sufficient as long as no-one with COVID symptoms has been in the building.
- If a known infected person has been in the building, all high-touch surfaces must be cleaned within 24 hrs with CDC-approved chlorine- or alcohol-based (at least 60%) solutions. Disposable paper towels will be used to wipe down all surfaces including pews, tables, chairs, light/heat switches doorknobs, railings, faucet handles in both kitchen and rest rooms, Cleaners should wear protective gloves while cleaning
- CoSM Building Operations Ministry is responsible for ensuring sufficient CDCapproved cleaning agents, supplies and equipment are available at all times
- Cleaning responsibility will be described in Building Use Guidelines.

King Soopers Grocery Cards

When you use your Sooper Card or Alt ID (phone number at King Soopers, you can automatically designate Namaqua UU to receive 5% of ALL of your purchases (including gas and lottery tickets!). **However, you must designate NUUC as your Community Rewards recipient on the King Soopers web site.** To do that:

- 1. Go to kingsoopers.com.
- 2. If you've already been on the site, sign in to your account. If you have not visited the site before, go to kingsoopers.com/signin?redirectUrl=/ and click on the Create an Account link at the bottom of the page, next to "New to King Soopers?" You will be asked for some basic information, a valid email address, and your King Soopers reward number. If you do not have a King Soopers rewards card, they are available at the customer service desk at any King Soopers.
- 3. Once you have signed into your account, hover over "My Account" (under your name in the top right corner of the page), then click on My Account in the drop-down menu.
- 4. On the left side of the page is a list of links. Under "My Account", click on the last link titled *Community Rewards*.
- 5. Search for Namaqua Unitarian Universalist Congregation and then click Enroll.
